HAVE WE GOT A NEW VICAR?

As reported in your Summer Issue, our Vicar, Revd D.Burden and his wife Enid have retired from their respective offices in the parish. With the advance notice given by them and a final Service as long ago as 10th September it is not surprising that the above question is frequently asked. However, as the following paragraphs explain, the Induction of a new Vicar lies some time ahead yet.

In the first place a retiring Vicar is entitled to a month's holiday before finally vacating his office and receiving his pension, and he will not nominate a retirement date until he has secured other accommodation, since he has to vacate the vicarage by that date.

Derek's retirement date was 19th October and it was only then that the legal wheels began to turn. Subsequently we were notified of the vacancy and of the need for a joint meeting of our Parochial Church Councils to appoint four representatives in connection with the selection of a new incumbent and to approve a joint Statement describing the conditions, needs and traditions of our parishes. This had to be done within four weeks or we would have lost our right to representation in any selection. We achieved this at a joint meeting on 10th November, following individual meetings of our Church Councils.

The next main point is that it is the right of the Patron to present a person to a benefice. Our benefice is Steeple Ashton with Semington and Keevil. It was the turn of Keevil's patron, the Dean and Chapter of Winchester, to exercise the right this time.

The patron may have a list of persons wishing to move or take up an incumbency, or he may consult with our own Diocese to see whether they have such a list: Failing that he may advertise nationally.

Before formally 'offering' any priest to a benefice the patron must give notice of this to the bishop and PCC representatives who must approve before the offer is made. On the other hand refusal has to be notified within two weeks by any of the PCC reps. or four weeks by this bishop.

There is a limit to this process. If within nine months from the date of the vacancy no priest has accepted the appointment, the right to select passes to the archbishop. We can ardently hope that we meet with success before 19th July 1990!

In the meantime your churchwardens, with the help and guidance of the Rural Dean, aim to maintain the normal Services. Your support by maintaining church attendances over the difficult period of any Interregnum is respectfully requested.

If you are fed up with the traditional Christmas pudding, try this one for a change. I doubt if it's less fattening though!

Christmas Ice Bombe

8 oz. Dried fruit salad roughly chopped

4 Tablesp. Ruby Port

Grated rind and juice of 1 orange

pt. Double Cream

3 ready made meringue nests

d teas. gr. cinnamon

4 pt. Greeked strained yogurt.



Place dried fruit in a bowl with the port, orange rind and juice. Leave to marinate 2-3 hours. Whip the cream until it just holds shape. Break the meringues into small pieces and fold into cream with marinated fruit, cinnamon and yogurt. Spoon mixture into la pt. pudding basin. Cover and freeze for at least 6 hours. To serve, remove Bombe from freezer and unmould onto a serving plate. Leave in the Fridge for about 15 mins. to soften slightly.
