On Sunday the 23rd June, starting at 11.00 am the Seventh Great Hinton Agony Run will start from the Linnet car park. As previously there will be the usual stalls, barbeque, skittles, raffle and at least 150 people trying to beat their personal best time around the three mile course.

Bill Barker has retired from the role of Organiser and through his efforts over the years many charities and the village have benefitted from his work in making every event a memorable occasion. In 1990 thirty villagers took part in the Run although there were only three ladies. Please look at the challenge as one of finishing irrespective of the time taken. The charity will still gain whatever your time. The fastest villager position will see several challengers this year after Paul Fennell's title (19 min 56 sec). Good luck Paul, Jeff, Stuart, Russell and not forgetting his dad who is still living down the embarrassment of being beaten by his son. Let's see another time under 20 minutes.

Many of the volunteers have expressed a commitment to continue their work in 1991; However there is always a need, particularly on the day, for additional help. If you are able to help please let Stuart Wickham or me know. Race Marshalls are always needed. Remember, the only excuse is to be running!

### A HELPING HAND

Caring for the disabled or a handicapped member of the family places an enormous strain on the family. It can mean having to come to terms with problems such as giving up work, forfeiting social life, never taking a holiday, and perhaps not being able to leave the house for more than an hour at a time.

This year's Agony Run Charity is the WILTSHIRE FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICE which is part of the Leonard Cheshire Foundation. Its aim is to relieve the home carer's situation by providing a care attendant to take over care for short periods of time, giving the family some respite.

Last year's efforts enabled a donation of £517 to be made to the Cancer and Leukaemia in Childhood Trust. The challenge ahead must be to beat this figure enabling over seventy local families to continue to benefit from the work of the WILTSHIRE FAMILY SUPPORT SERVICES, which although partially funded by client contributions and grants is highly dependent on charitable donations.

#### TRAINING TIPS

Whilst three miles may not seem to be that far, problems are caused by people over-stretching themselves, particularly in the early stages. How many times have you been overtaken on the hill into Steeple Ashton? It is not possible to suggest individual programmes but here are some useful tips:

- (1) If in any doubt about your health contact your GP before you start training
- (2) Start training NOW and gradually build up the distance covered. In the early stages distance is more important than speed. Aim to cover a distance greater than the run itself in the later stages of training. Don't be worried if you have to walk some of the way to begin with.
- (3) As training progresses work on the speed. Don't run at one speed but ensure that quality is built into your runs by sprinting over short distances, and then recovering at a jogging pace.
- (4) Make sure that you wear light coloured clothes and reflective tapes if running at night. WEAR SUITABLE SHOES.
- (5) Running is more enjoyable if you run with a partner. Essential if you are a child.
- (6) Sponsorship provides a good incentive to continue when the going gets tough.

Make the decision to enter NOW. Entry forms will be posted through every letterbox in April.

## PARISH COUNCIL A.G.M

Sixteen Parishioners and four Parish Councillors, the new and retiring Clerks, two members of the Wiltshire Constabulary and the County Councillor Mr.G.Roberts were present at the meeting held in the Village Hall on Wednesday 27th March. There were apologies from eight parishioners.

The Chairman, Mr. Vic Bush, gave his report dealing with planning applications, the clearance of Gypsy Lane, the need to drain Back Lane bridle way, the threatened removal of the old style telephone box which has not materialised yet, the unauthorised pub and business signs within the parish, and the map to show village houses and numbers. He referred to the Village Hall Committee and the forthcoming Agony Run and Barn Dance, the Ladies Club, and thanked those involved with organising the various village events.

Mrs. Carol Burch was introduced as the new Clerk and Mr. Richard Culverhouse, who has been Clerk for the past eight years, was thanked and presented with a silver engraved tankard from the Councillors.

Expenditure figures were given for the year as £306.54, and precepted for £445 in the present year because £392 was needed in election fees and Clerk's wages. This would be £2.68 per person.

It was decided to enter the Best Kept Village competition again this year, as we only lost by one mark last year. It is Parish Council election year, and anyone interested should see the Chairman or Blerk.

A short video film of Police in the Community was shown by the Police Sergeant. Afterwards PC Mark Newbery said he would try to get a sensor to monitor the speed and volume of traffic passing through the village. Motor bikes in Gypsy Iane were referred to, but it was pointed out that this is a public highway.

Parishioners were worried about lorries driving in the centre of the road from Steeple Ashton to the A 350 as the road is breaking up. Overgrown hedges in Stoggy Lane and the Narrows are a danger to pedestrians, and the burning of rubbish at Hag Hill is thought to be unsightly. Mr. Roberts agreed to give help with matters which concern the County departments.

The meeting closed and was followed by refreshments of coffee, tea and biscuits.

#### TABLE TENNIS TALK

The current table tennis season is due to finish shortly. The two teams based in the village have encountered mixed fortunes over the closing matches. Great Hinton 'A' have suffered a number of defeats since losing their long-unbeaten run. This has caused them to slip to a mid-table position, when promotion looked a strong possibility at the half-way stage.

The 'B' team has continued to perform consistently well. Whilst they look likely to finish some points adrift of the two promotion positions, they have secured fourth place. This is their highest ever placing in Division Two and augurs well for the next season.

It is hoped that the growing interest in the sport locally will enable us to expand next year and possibly allow a further team to be entered to represent the village. This underlines the fact that Great Hinton are one of the strongest clubs in the West Wiltshire league.

#### JUNIOR LEAGUE

A team from Great Hinton has been competing in the new Junior League. Although the league honours have gone to Clarendon School, there is a possibility that the village team comprising Russell Crumpler, Anthony Putt and Katy Putt, will have success in the individual and team tournaments due to be played after the Caster break. Regardless of their success in these competitions, the improvements they have made are very pleasing. Hopefully this first competitive season will provide a very sound base for even better things in the future.

#### SUNDAY AFTERNOON SESSIONS

With the imminent close of the table tennis season, these sessions will also stop for the duration of the summer. However, it is intended for similar sessions to be staged on the first Sunday in each month until September, namely:

May 5th, June 2nd, July 7th, August 4th

These will be held in the mornings from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. and should allow the youngsters to keep in practice throughout the close season.

If anybody is interested in playing table tennis at any age or standard, then please let me know on Devizes 870 202. You may be interested to learn that many players in the West Wiltshire League are over 70, so table tennis is not exclusively a 'Young Person's Sport'! Also, if you would like to organise a game or practice session then I will be happy to help in any way I can.
