The Eighth Great Hinton Agony Run

On the Tuesday before the event there were 30 entrants and just as many bottles for the bottle stall. If the event had to be cancelled then I had the consolation prize for each entrant !

By Sunday, after a few phone calls to 'Rent- a- Runner' the field had increased and over two hundred bottles/cans had been received.

Last year's concerns of our announcer, Mike Truman that rain and PA systems connected to the mains did not mix were completely unnecessary this year. At the sound of the starting whistle of Vic Bush, the runners departed from the village and the various stall holders started doing a brisk business.

A quality field ensured that the first three runners all finished within 15 minutes, led by the course record holder Chris Tweedie in 14 min 25 sec, albeit a full minute down on his record. A further 20 runners crossed the line before Judy Farr led the ladies home completing the course in 19 min 15 sec.

Ensuring that his name would appear on the Village cup again, Russell Crumpler knocked 25 seconds off the Villager record, finishing in a very creditable 17min. 15sec. Alison Fennell took the first Lady Villager's medal finishing in 29 minutes.

The aim of the day was to support the Dorothy House Foundation and at the Ladies Fete a cheque for £680 was handed over, with just over £500 being raised for Village Funds. This will ensure necessary maintenance is carried out to the Village Hall.

The success of the event depends on the generous gift of time and money from the villagers and a hearty thanks goes out to everyone concerned. A special thanks goes to Bill at the Linnet who paid for the medals, which provide a tremendous challenge and reward to the younger age groups. Lloyds Bank (Richard Clark) covered all the printing costs of the event and Kepak Meats (John Putt) provided the first prize for the Raffle. Many other donations were received from local businesses.

This event will feature on next year's calendar. If you would like to help and/or have any suggestions for making this an even more successful day then contact either Mike Truman or Kevin Crumpler.

DELICIOUS RECIPE FOR DEVIL'S FOOD CAKE:

6 oz. plain flour
 $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon bicarb. of soda
pinch of salt
2 oz. cocoa
 $7\frac{1}{2}$ fluid oz. water
4 oz. margarine
8 oz. sugar
2 eggs

Blend cocoa and water and set aside. Blend sugar and margarine until light and soft. Whisk eggs till frothy and add to fat and sugar and beat well. Stir in flour, bicarb. and baking powder alternately with cocoa and water. Divide the mixture between two well greased tins and cook for 30 - 35 minutes, 350° F.

CONTINUING MY REMINISCENCES OF GREAT HINTON :-

It seems strange we have a Parsonage Farm and Church Farm but no Church !

I can remember when wiring the only thatched cottage now remaining in Great Hinton in 1950 - in order to be able to place the wiring over the bedroom ceilings I had to cut a trap door opening. On climbing into the roof space there was the perfect skeleton of a cat that I suppose must have become trapped - as soon as I touched it, it fell into a heap of dust.

I can also remember when Hinton had two chapels.
