Lottery Funding & Tharity Status

At the time of going to print we had not heard whether we have been successful with the Lottery Fund bid however as the selection process takes several stages it is probably safe to assume that we have not been rejected at the early stages.

Even if we are successful then we still have a funding gap which will need bridging. Should you be aware of local companies planning to take an active role in the local community then please let the committee know. Another approach has been to take advantage of companies who provide match funding for their employees who take part in local events. Do you work for such a company and be willing to be sponsored for running the event?

The journey to gaining charity status has been plagued with minor legal issues and currently the Land Registry have returned our trust deed for a drafting discrepancy. We are indebted to Martin Cooper who is providing legal advice. The authorised Land Registry document is required for the Charity Status application.

An application has been made for funding of this year's Agony Run event from GWR Christmas Appeal - still outstanding. Hopefully in the next few weeks we will know the outcome of all these efforts.

As we approach Good Friday and Easter, I want to share with you some words by Gordon Harman, writing for the Christian News Service, under the heading of *THE CROSS*.

If you had been present at the crucifixion of Jesus Christ, where would you have stood? Not, I trust, among his bitter enemies, who mocked and insulted him. But what about among those who demand more miracles?

'Come down now from the cross, that we may see and believe.'

Or do you mishear and misunderstand him? 'Listen', said some 'he's calling Elijah'. Or would you be so disgusted with the mockery and insults as to say: 'Now let him alone', as did one man who also offered Jesus a soothing drink?

I hope you would be impressed, as the Roman officer was, with Jesus' great cry: 'It is finished (i.e. accomplished)' and with the manner in which Jesus gave himself to death: 'Father, into your hands I commit my spirit'. The officer's reaction?

'Truly this man was the Son of God'

Why not take your place among Jesus' devoted followers who went on trusting him no matter what?

Here then are questions for us to answer in the light of the truth that on the third day Jesus rose again, victorious over death for ever. Now he offers to all who will trust Him a share in his resurrection. Death need not be a cul-de-sac, but the gateway into a glorious new life with Him for ever.

Tafari Dinner - No 14 Taturday 9th May
