# Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal



## Your Air Ambulance Needs Your Support!

Now, as much as ever, the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal needs donations from individuals and fund-raising initiatives from community groups from your area, as well as every other village and town in Wiltshire.

Thanks to the generosity of the people of Wiltshire, nearly all of the necessary funding has been found in past years. This must continue in order for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance to survive.

Most people in the area covered by the Wiltshire Air Ambulance may often see the helicopter flying overhead on its way to hospital. They assume that it is paid for by public money. They are wrong. The Air Ambulance gets no statutory funding from either central government or the county health authority. Nor does it qualify for, or receive money from, the National Lottery.

Everyone has a stake in the Wiltshire Air Ambulance - an essential and unique service which serves all the people of Bath and Wiltshire and some area on the borders. It is there for those life and death situations which occur almost daily and which conventional road ambulances either cannot get access to or reach in time. The helicopter can be scrambled and reach any part of Wiltshire within eight to twelve minutes.

This financial year (April 1998 to March 1999) the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal has to raise £160,000 a year - that's more than £3,000 a week!

Since the Wiltshire Air Ambulance service started in 1990, it has flown almost 4,000 missions and airlifted more than 800 people to hospital for emergency medical treatment.

The Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal was established in 1991 with the express objective of fundraising to keep the Wiltshire Air Ambulance flying, by raising a quarter of the share of the annual costs of running the Wiltshire Air Support Unit helicopter. The remaining three quarters is funded by the Wiltshire Constabulary.

Sometime in the early summer of 1998, the Wiltshire Air Support Unit will start flying a new helicopter, the US-built McDonnell Douglas twin-turbine MD900 Explorer helicopter. As well as being twice as fast as its predecessor, the Bolkow 105, the new helicopter is 10 times quieter. The Explorer has 80% more cabin space and seating for eight people and will carry one stretcher and three passengers.

On 3 June the first meeting of the Memorial Hall Trust was held as part of the annual open Parish Meeting. At this meeting, the Management Committee of the Trust was elected. Although this marked the beginning of the work of the Trust, it is only a continuation of much hard work already carried out by a wide range of villagers in planning for and raising funds for a new Memorial Hall.

So why has the Trust been formed?

Now that a large amount of money has been raised towards a new Hall we need to manage that formally, and a Trust provides a high level of accountability and protection for those funds. The Trust is a charity and therefore we can now benefit from this charitable status; many grants are only accessible to charities. Already we have received grants which we can only use as a charity.

What is the job of the Trust?

It is primarily to provide the best Hall we can for the village and to encourage full use of the Hall. Given the present state of the Hall, this means that we will continue to raise funds with a view to building a new Hall as soon as possible. In addition the Trust's job is to manage the Hall, paying the bills for electricity, water, rates, insurance etc., and assuring its maintenance.

The next two years are going to be busy ones. The Trust, with the support of the Village Hall Committee and others, will be working hard to raise the money needed to replace the Hall. At the same time we will continue to plan the building of this new Hall.

# Agony Run Biscuits

I have had loads of requests for this recipe - so here goes.

80z Butter

4oz Caster Sugar

1teasp Vanilla Essence

80z Self-raising Flour

20z Drinking Chocolate

Cream butter with the sugar and vanilla essence, then work in the flour and chocolate. Divide into pieces the size of a Walnut and roll into balls. Place on a baking sheet and flatten with large fork.


To freeze: open freeze - then pack in rigid containers, cover, label and freeze.

<u>To cook:</u> take straight from freezer, place on a greased baking tray in oven (190 ° C) 375F gas mark 5, 12≥15 minutes - leave to firm for a few minutes on tray, then cool on wire rack.

Makes approximately 36 biscuits.
