GREAT HINTON MEMORIAL HALL TRUST UPDATE

The Trust continues to work on fund raising and planning for a new Hall.

Community First (formerly the Community Council for Wiltshire) is providing us with much support in our work and through them it appears very likely that we will be receiving a grant of £20,000 from a local organisation that makes major contributions towards community projects like ours.



If we receive that £20,000 we will then have funds or commitments of support of £50,000. We are also due to put in some further grant applications very shortly to try to add to this amount.

You may recall that a major grant application was made some time ago to 21st Century Halls, one of the National Lottery programmes. We were unsuccessful with this application although the feedback we received indicated that the application was well regarded. Recently a representative from the Lotteries Commission has contacted Chris Munday, who led this application, to inform us that we are still on the reserve list for funding and that there was a possibility of some of the successful Project applicants dropping out. So watch this space!

A BOOK OF KEEVIL

The Keevil Society launched the second volume of "A Book of Keevil", in the Village Hall, Keevil, on Sunday 6th December.

Many villagers have contributed articles, loaned or taken photographs, to provide a unique and comprehensive chronicle of life, both past and present, of this Wiltshire village.

This second volume of the "A Book of Keevil" again presents a series of chapters ranging from the distant past - we find out more about the mysterious Coople Church - to our own times. Shops, pubs, forges, the cricket team are all recorded, and one chapter considers the weather in six recent Januarys. We also have an 18th century love story and an account of the curacy of the father of the diarist Kilvert.

A series of articles deal with Keevil Airfield. It relies on government archives, which record operations from Keevil and also the reminiscences and photographs of men who served and flew from Keevil. It provides a remarkable account of this important aspect of the village's history.

The book is soft covered, printed on high quality art paper, consisting of 140 A4 pages, well illustrated, with 138 photographs and 36 documents. It is priced at £11.00 - and may be ordered from the Society's Secretary on 01380 870491.

VILLAGE HISTORY

On Wednesday 18th November the Ladies Club held an open meeting, when they were joined by a good number of friends from the village to hear Mr Kenneth Rogers, retired county archivist speak about the origin of the village, with special reference to Great Hinton.

With the aid of slides of maps and plans dating back to 1760 we heard the manorial system was the medieval social and economic system of holding land from the manor in return for service.

The land was cultivated in strips by those working for the manor. Gradually a rental system evolved.

We saw slides of the older properties in the village and learnt that the manor of Great Hinton, which would originally have owned all the land on which the village has grown up, is possibly the house now known as Church farm.

Mr Rogers could throw no light on the subject of how the manor became known as Church Farm or how the house now known as Manor House or Manor Farm as it was until approximately twenty years ago, achieved its present status.

Carol Clark thanked Mr Rogers for a most interesting and informative evening.
