Bus Shelter

More Good News! We have received confirmation from Wiltshire County Council that they have approved our grant for 50% of the cost. We have also been advised by West Wilts District Council that the proposal does not require planning permission.

With all the obstacles now overcome we will be seeking three competitive tenders for the construction work. Subject to affordability we hope the new shelter will be constructed in red brick under a tiled roof. The shelter is being designed to give protection from the weather whilst ensuring both that there is good visibility of approaching buses and it is a safe environment.

Hopefully the construction will go ahead this autumn and provide shelter this winter for our children who use the stop to catch a school bus and other bus travellers.

Fore Street Farm

Prior to the sale of the property the council gave consent for a new dwelling alongside the village hall, subject to various emergency repairs to the existing Fore Street Farm House. The council await the proposals from the new owner, but have already resolved to be supportive of any application that will secure the long-term future of this prominent listed building. I will endeavour to keep you apprised of developments.

Brian Shipman - Parish Council Vacancy

As many of you will know Brian and Helen have sold their house and are moving on. Consequently Brian tendered his resignation as a parish councillor at our recent meeting. On behalf of the Parish Council I would like to thank Brian for his service to our community over the last few years.

Brian's departure has created a vacancy on the Parish council and I would welcome volunteers to replace him. Duties are far from onerous as they involve attending approximately 6 or 7 meetings per annum, with very occasional, and entirely optional, meetings at West Wilts District level.

Great Hinton Memorial Hall Trust

The Trust was formed on 31 December 1997 to manage the Memorial Hall. On 10 May we held the Trust AGM and to make it easier for people to attend we have held the Trust Committee and Community Committee AGMs together. The content of the Annual Trust Report covered the kind of issues that have been the subject of the regular Trust section in the Grapevine, so to summarise 2003-04:

- We secured a £1965 grant from the Millennium Commission which was matched by donations from the Community Committee, the Lunch Club, the Ladies Club and the Safari Supper, plus some funds from the Trust itself. With this we created a fully furnished kitchen suitable for catering for Hall events and purchased new tables for the Hall. It should be mentioned that Doris and Derek Saville also very kindly donated a double oven and a ceramic hob.
- Hall usage continues to remain high and income from lettings has increased.
- In the financial report it was noted that going into 2004/05 the Trust has less money in reserves than at the start of 2003/04. This is because of the funds it added to the Millennium Commission grant. However, assuming income continues at a similar level we should be able to build up our reserves over the next two to three years.
- The following people were either nominated by user groups or elected to the Trust Committee for 2004/05: Carol Clarke, David Harnott, Neil Haynes, Chris Munday, Derek Saville, and Mike Truman.

Great Hinton Community Committee

The Community Committee exists to arrange events for the local community – those who live in the village and nearby. It's a well-established committee and works hard to put on a number of events each year.

From our County Councillor's Newsletters

SPEED LIMITS IN VILLAGES

Every year in March the County Council decides which roads deserve new speed limits. The Council has agreed to reduce speed limits outside thirteen schools in the County, in all cases to 30mph from 40, 50 or 60mph.

However of over 120 requests from Parish Councils for lower speed limits none have been granted. This repeats the pattern of previous years, when the excuse has been that the County was "waiting for government guidance" on speed limits. This guidance has now arrived, so the excuse this year is that they need to think about it for twelve months.

NURSERY EDUCATION GRANT

is now available for all three year olds. Parents who wish to take up the free places should contact their childcare provider. Free places are available for children born before 1st April 2001 for the summer term, 1st September 2001 for autumn term, and 1st January 2002 for Spring term 2005. CHECK YOUR SHEDS!

On 31st March it became illegal to store some garden pesticides. DEFRA has set up a website (www.pesticides.gov.uk) so you can check if you have any of the banned ones.

STEEPLE ASHTON SHOP AND PRE-SCHOOL

STASH have submitted an application to create a village shop within the school buildings, and a nursery school will open in the new year, subject to planning permission. If you know of anyone requiring the services of a pre-school contact Kyrstie Burrows on 01225 759203.

RIGHTS OF WAY

The proposal to grade the County's footpaths into 3 groups is about to be approved by Cabinet. 25% of Parish Councils responded to the consultation in 2002. 2 opposed the plan, 23 fully supported, and 12 supported with some reservations. The main concern is that 'Group 3' rights of way will simply be neglected, especially as they'll only be inspected once every 5 years. However officers claim that reported obstructions will still be dealt with as soon as possible. There is though no increase in the resources available to the RoW department, and the amount of work they have to do maintaining footpaths and bridleways, as well as responding to changes in legislation, is increasing.

Great Hinton needs a footpath officer.

Do these snippets stir the memories of schooldays?

Although coming from Surrey to the village 14 years ago, my first day at school was spent at St Peter's Primary in Bath Road, Devizes back in 1951. I was definitely not a happy schoolboy. To the family I was something special as I was named after my grandfather and like him I was left-handed. But at school that was a problem as all the inkwells in the desks were in the top right-hand corner and unless I changed my ways I would never be able to write without dropping ink blots across my exercise books. So for the first two formative weeks in school I sat on my own with the pencil in the right hand trying to write as well as I could with my left. This led to total frustration and anguish until my parents called on the teacher to accept that my left-handed writing was perfectly legible. They did promise her (whose name is the only one I cannot remember of all my primary teachers) that I would practice my handwriting in an exercise copybook. Which I did sitting at the dining room table and until 1970 when the table was sold it bore the indelible impression of one of the exercises. Unfortunately shabby chic and distressed furniture was not in vogue at the time and my parents had paid good money for a new dining-room suite when the price of furniture was still at a premium after the War.

I have survived being a lefty, cack-handed, sinistrous, to name but a few – but have been "left" totally confused. I play golf right-handed, but badminton with my left which seems to nicely confuse the opposition. I hold a knife and fork the right way round, but not a spoon and fork. It is often useful to be able to use a screwdriver in either hand but not a hammer. As a left footed player I might have been useful to the England football team, and as a wicket keeper I could catch with either hand.

Now with a grand daughter aged 14 months who seems to prefer left-hand to right, my daughter-in-law has referred me to Dr Miriam Stoppard's New Baby Care Book (Whatever happened to Dr Spock?). She says "Never, ever try to dissuade your baby from being left-handed. You could well risk causing psychological side effects, like stuttering as well as reading and writing difficulties by altering what your baby's brain naturally wants to do."
