

Road Safety - The Strand

It was with great sadness that we learnt of another fatal road accident at The Strand in the last few weeks. The Parish Council has long campaigned for action by the County Council, as the responsible highways authority, to improve road safety around The Lamb and the junction with the road to the village. How many more people must die or be seriously injured before the Council take action?

We strongly believe that there needs to be a speed limit of 40 mph to restrict speed at this dangerous location, yet the Council say that they do not recognise that the area is in any way dangerous. The Council's policy, which we find incomprehensible, is that until there have been 3 fatalities in a 2 year period they do not regard any location as a priority for action. At a location where there have been numerous serious accidents in recent years we find this approach unacceptable.

In the light of this dreadful accident your Parish Council will be renewing our campaign for action by the County Council. As with all such issues however, the more people who make their feelings known to the Council the more impact any campaign will have. As most people in our village have to use this junction very regularly I would ask that as many of you as possible write to the Council to press for urgent action. Together we might just make a difference!

Road Safety - Coldharbour Crossroads

Some months ago a local business erected a new, and much enlarged, advertising sign adjacent to Coldharbour crossroads. Your Parish Council were so concerned by the potential distraction to drivers caused by this sign, coupled with the intrusive nature of the sign in a rural location, we contacted the District Council Planning Department to raise our concerns.

As a consequence the planning enforcement officer conducted an investigation and concluded that this sign requires planning consent, which has resulted in a retrospective planning application being submitted. I would again ask that if you feel strongly on this issue you should write before 15th September to the Planning Department at WWDC quoting the planning reference 07/02468/ADV.
