A reluctant farmer, Gilbert was nonetheless someone who cared greatly for the welfare of his animals and was active on his land until as recently as last summer. We all miss seeing him on the tractor which he was driving until last Autumn with Clive bravely on the back giving the hand signals. Those of us who were lucky enough to know him will long remember him with great affection. Personally I will always remember him telling me that the day he moved to Great Hinton, at the age of 17, was the worst day of his life - having left his young friends behind in (far away) Potterne he found himself in "a village of old people". At the funeral service there was a collection of £205 which has been given to the Wiltshire Air Chris Munday Ambulance.

The open day was a huge success and many thanks to those members of the community who not only visited the school, but bought some super old photographs to add to the collection. A very big thank you goes to Great Hinton Village Hall who very kindly donated the use of their crockery and without their support we would have a lot of very dry mouths! The day demonstrated what superb support there is from the whole community.

Now the building has at last been finished, we are in a position to comfortably house the growing numbers of children. We presently have 96 pupils in school and early indications are that we are easily up to our target intake of 15 for Reception Class this coming September. It is reassuring to be in such a secure position.

We were delighted to survive our recent Ofsted inspection and come out of it with such a good result. To get nothing below a rating of 2 (good) is fantastic. A good may not sound great, but when translated from Ofsted speak to proper English it really means very good and with a 1 (outstanding) for pupil enjoyment – well – you can't get much better can you? With the various issues that the school community has coped with since last year, it is a testament to the strength and commitment of everyone involved in the school that we have achieved this.

The Church inspection that followed the Ofsted picked out that "the school, through its distinctive Christian character, is outstanding at meeting the needs of all learners. Pupils at Keevil Primary School love their school. They know that they are highly valued by all the staff and want to work hard for their teachers. They enjoy coming to school and feel safe and secure within a caring Christian community. They feel that they are treated fairly and are becoming mature, responsible people who are increasingly able to use strategies to resolve any difficulties as and when they arise."

I would like to thank everyone for their support for this fantastic school and I look forward to building on this success further in the coming years.

Road Safety - The Strand - An Update

In the last edition of The Grapevine I highlighted our continuing concern about road safety around the junction of the village road and the A361 and The Lamb. Ciara McVeigh, who is our local Police Community Officer, attended our recent Parish Council meeting and was able to report that the Police also consider this to be an area of concern to them.

A recent survey by The Wiltshire Speed Camera Partnership has, however, showed that only a small percentage of traffic on this section of the A361 breaks the national speed limit of 60 mph. The threshold for intervention by the Partnership is for 20% or more of all traffic to be in excess of the prevailing limit, consequently there will be no action on this front. The Parish Council remain convinced that the real problem is that the limit is too high and should be reduced.

The good news is that Ciara has advised that the Police believe that safety could be improved if the length of "double white lines" is extended, further restricting overtaking. As a first step to improved road safety we are very supportive of the Police in this and will be lobbying both the Officials and the politicians at the County Council for early action.

Road Safety - Coldharbour Crossroads - An Update

The planning application for the enlarged, advertising sign adjacent to Coldharbour crossroads was refused by The District Council. The company subsequently appealed that decision to The Secretary of State, but I am pleased to report that this appeal was also unsuccessful. We hope that this means that this potentially dangerous sign will be removed in the near future.

A Small Success

The recent replacement of the water main through Keevil resulted in the road through their village being closed for a number of weeks either side of Christmas. As a Parish Council we were astonished to discover the traffic diversion sent both cars and commercial vehicles through Main Street of our village and the narrow single track road to The Strand. As a direct result of bringing

our concerns to the attention of the Highways Department common sense for once prevailed and the signage for the diversion was changed to send the rerouted traffic via the A350 and A361. It is not often that we achieve success so quickly but it is nice to know that occasionally we can make a difference.
