Community Area Network

Wiltshire Council in partnership with the Police, NHS Wiltshire and the Fire and Rescue Service already have a citizens panel of over 3,500 Wiltshire residents that answer surveys 2-3 times a year on important issues. The results are fed back to each organisation so that changes in policies and strategies can be made.

For the first time participation is offered through electronic means and if you want to take part all that is needed is to go to the link below. This will take you to an electronic survey which should take no more than 10 minutes to fill out – once you have finished the survey you click on

submit and that's it. It's entirely free and you decide whether you want to reply or not.

If you take part you will be sent a newsletter telling you what has happened as a result of the surveys.

We abide by the Market Research Societies code of conduct so all your data will be securely held and we won't pass any of your details on to any other organisations without your permission.

WILTSHIRE COUNCIL NEWS FROM JONATHON SEED

Member Summerham and Seend Division

Summer is drawing to an end and what a dry season it has been. I cannot remember so little rain in one summer and so it is ironic that I have spent much of this summer working on flood alleviation in Wiltshire. I chair the northern half of the county's Operational Flood Working Group and in July I represented Wiltshire Council at the Wessex Water Customer Liaison Panel meeting in Bath as well as attending the National Flood Forum on behalf of the Council in London. This latter meeting was particularly interesting as the Minister responsible for flooding, Richard Benyon MP, used it as an opportunity to announce rare additional government funding for flooding (£2m.) and also to announce that the Government is planning major changes to sewage disposal including the making over of all sewage pipes to the water authorities. Finally, I have also been working on a flood presentation for all the Area Boards and will be delivering this across the county starting in the autumn.

In June I was re-elected as the Chairman of the Melksham Area Board. I was also pleased to see that the deputy Leader of the Council fulfilled his promise to offer the seven parishes of Summerham and Seend a formal review concerning their placing in the Melksham Community Area. None of the Parish Councils asked for such a review and so the Division stays in the Melksham Community Area. The Melksham Area Board itself goes from strength to strength and it really is becoming an influential part of our community life. We have recommended to the Council the retention of land for a link between the A350 and the Industrial Estate which will help with industrial regeneration and job creation in the Area. It is also of note that partly as a result of the lead taken by our Area Board, we have come out of the County Leisure Review exceptionally well and that within the next three years we can look forward to a brand new Leisure Centre and Swimming Pool almost certainly adjacent to the new Melksham Oaks School. This location will be very handy for all of the residents of Summerham and Seend.

I am always happy to engage in community projects both small and large and I was delighted that Great Hinton was able to secure a small community grant towards the maintenance of the village telephone box.

Parish Council Report

Now that the phone box has had its new coat of paint and gold highlights added, it is hoped to put in it the footpath map and a few books for people to borrow and replace with others. Chris Munday is looking into putting up shelves and measuring to find what size map we need. Not much new is happening apart from the ongoing saga of the barn in Stoggy Lane which failed to gain retrospective planning approval. The owners have now applied for a garage there which is going through the consultation and planning process.

Our thanks and appreciation go to David Harnott for the years he has run the Memorial Hall Trust Committee and worn many hats – secretary, health and safety, 100 Club and treasurer. With the programme of maintenance and improvements overseen by David, the Hall is in as good a condition as it was when opened 10 years ago. And with prudent budgeting he has ensured that we have reserves to face unforeseen expenses. Richard Clarke Hall Trust treasurer.



Questions were asked at the Parish Council AGM about the possibility of reducing the speed limit through the village as we have no street lighting or pavement. As the traffic survey undertaken earlier in the year did not record many motorists exceeding the 30 mph limit County Highways will not be making any changes although many villagers present at the meeting felt that the current limit is too high.

Villagers in Whiteshill and Ruscombe, Gloucestershire, who put up signs urging motorists to slow down to 20 mph have been forced to remove most of them. Their parish council paid £1,000 for 15 "20 is Plenty" signs last August due to road safety fears but villagers have been told by the County Council that the signs cannot be given permission to stay up permanently. Gloucestershire Highways allowed them to stay up temporarily as part of the villagers' antispeeding campaign, but residents have been told they are not official signs and only two can stay up outside the local primary school as an advisory limit.

A statement from the County Council said: "While we understand people's concerns, the signs cannot stay up on

a permanent basis because they are not legal. We have agreed to investigate the possibility of introducing a 20mph limit for the whole of the Whiteshill area, subject to the guidelines being approved by our scrutiny committee."

20's Plenty For Us was formed in order to campaign for the implementation of 20 mph as the default speed limit on residential roads in the UK. This site aims to provide the arguments for 20's Plenty in a coherent understood form with links to other material that shows how 20's Plenty saves lives and makes very little difference to actual journey times.

In December 2009 the Department for Transport issued revised guidance recommending 20 mph limits for all roads which are primarily residential in nature and into town and city streets where pedestrian and cyclist movements are high, such as around schools, shops, markets, playgrounds and other area which are not part of any major through route. Whilst not specifically addressing rural roads there are useful precedents to build on.



BARKING UP THE WECKS TREE ...

Sometimes a barking dog can drive us barking mad. If it's your dog annoying the neighbours, why not check out the Anti Bark Dog Collar? It is a battery-operated device that uses high-pitched frequencies to teach your dog not to bark. A vibration sensor detects whenever the dog barks then emits a series of very high-pitched tones, which irritate your dog, distracting it from whatever it was focusing on. Reinforce the dog's training with a firm 'No" and it will usually learn to associate barking with the unpleasant noise, which should reduce or even eliminate 'nuisance' barking.

(My apologies to dog owners if I am barking up the wrong tree. Editor.)

"Barking up the wrong tree" originally came from the U.S. in the 19th century when hunting dogs were used to flush out racoons which took refuge in trees. The allusion is to hunting dogs barking at the bottom of trees where they mistakenly think their quarry is hiding.
