

## WASPS IN THE ROOF

When the trap door from the garage into the roof space was opened a few wasps were flying about in there, suggesting a nest somewhere. However, a quick scan of the roof timbers revealed nothing — a nest of the usual size of a football or smaller was nowhere to be seen. On closer inspection with a powerful torch a few wasps could be seen coming from a corner of the roof timbers at floor level.

The nest was HUGE, 40-50 cm (1'4" to 1'6") in diameter. Having killed off the flying wasps (and they were large too!), the nest was pulled out and off the timbers. It was lowered to ground level in a sheet as it was heavy and delicate.





It was cut open to reveal its layered construction, with open and capped cells (where the eggs are laid and grubs develop).



The nest had an outer 'skin' of shaved wood which would have been gathered by the wasps from nearby fences and sheds, hence the various colours. So when you see a wasp and hear a faint scratching noise on a fence, it is collecting material for the nest.



The nest was kept for a while, but as there was little interest from the villagers and two local schools for their science lessons, it was offered to Stonar School who were keen to have it for theirs.

It's important to note that you should never attempt to remove a wasp nest yourself. Always ask a professional, who will have all the correct protective clothing and equipment.

# GREAT HINTON MEMORIAL HALL TRUST

At the AGM in May I was pleased to report that in the year to the end of March a surplus of £1683 had been added to the funds. This includes the second of the three grants of £500 from the Parish Council.

Underpinning our finances is the 100 Club, run by Rachael Lawes and her team of collectors whose efforts have again kept the membership high and handed over the surplus of £915 after paying out prizes of £880. We are also grateful for the donation of £125 from the Ladies Club as well as the surplus of £175 given to the hall funds from the Village Fete run by the ladies and helpers. The Lunch Club was able to make a donation of £70 as well as buying new mugs. We have also installed a heater in the upstairs toilet and bought new kettles and a vacuum cleaner.

There were no unexpected bills in the year, so our cash balance held in the bank account has increased to £10,016 at the year end. It has been our aim to build our reserves to £10,000, so towards this target the trustees are now able to set aside £8000 which is up from last year's £6500. This leaves what is in effect working capital of £2000 so our financial position is sound.

However, always we live on a knife edge and depend very much on the support of the villagers through their membership of the clubs and 100 Club and joining in the social events. Without the bonus of income from any elections needing a polling station and excluding the final grant of £500 from the Parish Council, we are budgeting a surplus of just under £500 for the current year, but the trustees have decided that there is no need to increase the hourly rate from £7 an hour.

Having previously brought the hall's insurance cover up-to-date, this year's task of the committee has been to review the Trust Deed, which prescribed what trustees can do and how, and what they cannot do. Changes to the Deed approved during the year now allow for up to four elected trustees (previously two) to serve for a term of three years (previously one).

In addition to the elected trustees, the Deed continued the right of the Ladies Club, the Community Committee and the Parish Council to nominate one trustee each. These trustees now served until such time as replacement nominations are made by the respective organisations.

Consequently, at the AGM Andy Saunders and I were elected to serve as trustees for 3 years. Sandra Crumpler and Sue Andrew continue as trustees representing the Ladies' Club and the Parish Council respectively; and the Community Committee has nominated Graham Holmes to replace Jon Lawes whose advice as trustee we have greatly appreciated. Sue Smith will continue to offer health and safety advice to the Committee.

Keith Strickland also resigned as a trustee. During the year he had taken on the role of secretary to the Trust and pursued a number of issues to make sure the trustees were operating within the terms of the Trust Deed and Charity Commission regulations. Keith felt that his position as a trustee might result in a conflict of interest with his advice as secretary, but we will continue to benefit from Keith's independent advice as he has offered to remain as secretary.

#### HEDGEHOG-FRIENDLY HINTON

Hedgehogs, beloved by all, are in serious decline so please help Great Hinton to be a more hedgehog-friendly village by making your garden into a hog haven. Some things are obvious, others less so ...

- Check long grass or vegetation for hiding hedgehogs before mowing or strimming. Their natural defence mechanism is to curl into a ball which sadly isn't protection against machinery.
- Try not to use slug pellets or pesticides as not only will this reduce the number of insects available for hedgehogs to eat, you might also make hedgehogs very ill or even kill them.
- Ensure that the sides of ponds are gently sloping to allow hedgehogs to climb out, or use a piece of chicken wire to form a ramp.

Hedgehogs can remain active well into November and December and will often move nesting sites during hibernation. But if you see a hedgehog that's really small out and about at this time of year, get in touch with British Hedgehog Protection Society for some advice: info@britishhedgehogs.org.uk or 01584 890 801.

Their most favourite foods are worms, beetles, slugs, caterpillars, earwigs and millipedes, and they'll also eat fallen fruit. Meat-based cat or dog food, special hedgehog food, along with a few crushed unsalted peanuts, raisins or mealworms are all great for hungry hedgehogs. A bowl of fresh water will be also be appreciated by any hog out and about.

Hibernacula, the nests in which hedgehogs hibernate, may be made in log-piles, compost heaps, patches of brush or in specially built hedgehog nest boxes. Bonfires are also ideal hibernacula, so make sure you check yours before lighting them, or relocate them on the day of burning.

Hedgehogs are quite picky about what they use to make their hibernation nests, so try and make sure there are always dead leaves somewhere in the garden. Leaf– and wood-piles are also valuable foraging areas as they contain lots of insects.

Sleeping hedgehogs will be warm to the touch, whilst hibernating ones are cooler. The spines of a hibernating hedgehog will still prickle if touched but the spines of a dead one will not. Do not disturb hibernating hedgehogs as it may cause them to stir and use up valuable energy reserves.

## **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH NEWS**

Those of you on my NHW mailing list would have been alerted to the recent burglary at the farm in Cold Harbour. Unfortunately, they revisited several days later and took many more items. This also happened in Ashton Common during August, so please be very wary if you have outbuildings etc. These people will probably stake out the property beforehand, so be vigilant and please make sure you make a note of any vehicles you feel are suspicious as a registration number or even a picture taken on your mobile phone may help the police trace any potential criminals.

Some of you have reported telephone scams in the form of fraudsters posing as the "HMRC". The calls are usually very threatening, and it has been quite upsetting for some people. Remember, these are scams and although they seem very convincing, please do not give any information to them over the phone. Do not use any telephone numbers the fraudsters give you and never give any personal information to anyone over the phone.
